


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




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Here are other great ways to help grow YOUR reader:

"Music"

Baby (0-12 months): Sing to your child whenever possible, such as at home, in the car, or during a walk.

Twinkle Twinkle

Toddler (1-3 years): Sing more complex songs with unfamiliar words. This exposes your child to new vocabulary and sounds.

When I get all steamed up, hear my shout:
Tip me over and pour me out!

Preschooler (3-5 years): Make simple instruments from items around the house. Try filling a plastic bottle with cereal to make a rattle. A pie plate makes a great cymbal when struck with a wooden spoon!
